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ITI Bridges the Gap and Works with High School Art Educators in Atlanta

Finding middle ground was of the utmost importance, a way to teach in a manner that serves students and carries art education into the 21st Century.

In early June of this year, representatives from ITI were invited by Raymond Veon, Interim Director, Fine and Performing Arts, Department of Learning Excellence, Atlanta Public Schools (APS) to facilitate a ThinkTank for AP and IB high school art teachers in the Atlanta area. This was a part of the APS conference, (Re) Thinking the Foundation, Shifting the Lens 2011. Also invited to the two-day professional development extravaganza were notables Howard Gardner, Eric Booth, Bruce Taylor and Olivia Gude. The event was the finale to a two-year initiative to transform arts education in Atlanta.

Richard Siegesmund, Clint Samples, and I represented ITI in Atlanta as ThinkTank facilitators. We spent part of two days with the participants, as they learned from one another about their respective programs and intentions working as an art teacher in a public school. Initially we broke into focus groups to discuss the cultural, conceptual, and historical frameworks of AP and IB art education. Each group reported back to the whole and thus began a great dialog about intentions and actualities.

This engaged group proved they were stakeholders through their intense debate about the best practices for art education on the secondary level. The passionate discussion was packed with commentary, disagreements, concerns, and ultimately hope for both their students and the future of art education itself. We found these instructors to be dynamic, invested, concerned, and willing to listen. They work with great diligence to assure student intellect in, with, and through the arts.

For them, this includes a sense of play or exploration and understanding that art educators help people learn via hand-held material manipulation. This intelligent and energetic group of professionals debated and elaborated on what tomorrow's classroom will look like and how to engage their administrators in their work. The following are the findings they presented to the participants at the end of the conference:

What is important about AP and IB art courses?

- A recognized adjudicated forum to test drive 21st Century concepts
- Focuses alignment of curriculum and resources down through K-12and up to post secondary
- Creates a nationwide coalition of motivated teachers to drive rich conversation
- Can be a model good teaching
- What are the advantages of the AP and IB courses for students?
- The curriculum can engender a classroom where students become: adaptable, curious, playful, productive, explorative, engaged, perseverant, synthesizers who are
- disciplined towards completion of long-term projects.
- Outsiders—including the program asses-

sors, administrators, and parents—become stakeholders in assessments.

- Students learn more about themselves through personal choices of themes, media, compositions etc. This leads to surprising self-discovery greater confidence in self-expression. This is really the content that art allows us to teach.
- Students learn how to operate within a culture of respect and evaluation (both self and peer.)
- The curriculum engages all students in learning.
- What will tomorrow's classroom look like?

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Expanding Publications

Integrative Teaching International currently offers two publications: *Future Forward* and *State of Play*.

We launched our publications program with State of Play in 2009. Led by Anthony Fontana and Stacey Isenbarger, a group of emerging educators created the first edition of this book following ThinkTank 4. Our expanded and re-designed edition, which was finalized in June 2011, contains nine warmup exercises and nine extended projects. Our new publication, FutureForward, is becoming an annual journal. The first issue, titled Four Minds for the Future, published in fall 2010, offered extensive articles and sample assignments inspired by ThinkTank 5. The second issue, Manifestos and Manifestations, was distributed in April 2011 to coincide with the biennial FATE conference. This issue offered four very different philosophical positions and detailed the types of curriculum and assignments these programs inspire.

In June 2011, Mathew Kelly took over as editor of *FutureForward*. Working with Think-Tank 6 facilitators Michael Arrigo, Anthony Fontana, Bill Hill and Stacy Isenbarger, plus a team of Future Forward assistant editors, he is developing our third issue, titled Leading Change. It is due out by the end of the year.

Mat is also developing ideas for a special issue of *FutureForward*, titled Get With the Program: Teaching Technology and Teaching Technologies. Due out in 2013 to coincide with the biennial FATE conference, this issue will focus on the unique qualities of new technologies and how they enhance the communication and creation of ideas. What visualization technologies will best extend student capabilities? What educational technologies will best expand teaching effectiveness?

When is it appropriate to use a new technology exclusively, and when should it be integrated with more traditional approaches? How can both emerging and master educators master the new technologies they are being asked to teach?

While we already have a preliminary list of possible contributors to this issue, we really want to send out a broader call for proposals, focusing on the following questions:

1. What is the new technology you wish to discuss?

2. In what curricular context is it used?3. How do instructors learn both the technology and develop effective pedagogies?4. What is the effect on student learning?5. What advice can you offer to others seeking to use this technology?

We are also developing a new publication, called Integrative Teaching Advisory. Inspired by two-page advisories distributed by NAEA, we want to provide substantial and lively advice on curriculum design, personnel review processes, leadership, pedagogy, and other practical topics. This publication will be coedited by Dr. Richard Siegesmund and Mary Stewart, and submissions length can be up to 1000 words.

We plan to distribute a prototype of this publication in fall 2011, and will invite submissions from all Think Tankers, probably using the following deadlines: January 5 and June 5 each year.
